The end of Primary School

Most Tanzanian children finish their formal education at the end of primary school. The seven year course has subject specific exams and the result is considered significant. A small number of those who are successful move on to a four year secondary O-level course (Cambridge Overseas).

We pay for the smaller classes, more personal attention, higher standards, textbooks, toilets, and lessons delivered through the medium of English offered by Moshi Academy. Without English it is difficult to succeed. Besides, the children love their school.

In February this year, on our most recent visit to Tanzania (see our Spring and Summer issues for details) the headteacher of Moshi Academy summoned us to his office. He wanted our three final year students to join the majority of their classmates and board at the school. He was sure that a more intensive school experience would improve their grades. We were sceptical..... but delighted to be proved wrong.

Lunch Provided - Kitaa 'daycare'

The Trust also pays for the on-site daycare nursery for children aged 2 to 4 years. We budget for this this separately. It's a gift to the community. Over 40 children living locally or collected from the poor market area are given free daycare. Some families can offer to pay a little towards their children's care but for all it is subsidised, and for most children it is free.

This year daycare welcomed a new teacher, Rosemary. We plan to feature Daycare in a future issue.
